Second suicide attack said due in Europe

LONDON (AP) — Air France reported Saturday night it has received a warning that Japanese revolutionaries may attempt a suicide attack at a European airport.

Scotland Yard said the Paris office of Interpol, the international police organization, warned airports throughout Europe to be on full security alert.

Three Japanese revolutionaries said to be collaborating with Arab guerrillas opened fire in a surprise massacre last Tuesday at Israel's international airport. Air France said it was warned that a similar attack may be attempted Monday somewhere in Europe.

The warning came in a telex message to Air France offices in London, Manchester and Paris from another airline, a spokesman for the French company said. He declined to give the name of the airline that sent it.

Israel's international airport at Tel Aviv went on special alert Saturday night and ambulances rushed to the runway on suspicion that a hijack or terrorist attempt might be under way aboard an Air France jetliner en route from Paris and Rome.

The alert was a false alarm and ambulances and troops surrounding the plane were withdrawn shortly after the aircraft landed. The plane was the same flight which carried the three Japanese terrorists who waged last week's massacre.

The alert appeared to be connected with the warning in Europe. It was the second false alarm at Tel Aviv since the massacre. Thursday night an alert was called and six flights were checked under heavy guard, but nothing was found. The attackers at Tel Aviv

Japanese to help Israel airport dead

JERUSALEM (AP) — Japan asked officially Sunday for Israeli forgiveness for last week's massacre at Tel Aviv airport by three Japanese terrorists and said it would pay compensation to the victims.

Kenji Fukunaga, a special diplomatic envoy sent by Tokyo, conveyed Japan's apologies to Premier Golda Meir in a 45-minute meeting.

"My government is ready to do all it can to help the victims of the tragedy," Fukunaga told Mrs. Meir. He also gave her a letter from Prime Minister Eisaku Sato expressing his condolences.

The gunmen killed 24 persons and wounded 70.

Fukunaga said the Israeli premier responded "with gratitude for our prompt reaction."

Two of the Japanese terrorists, who were hired by the Marxist Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine, died in the airport attack Tuesday and the third was captured. Seventy persons were wounded.

Fukunaga told a news conference that Japan would also donate money for humanitarian projects in Israel as partial compensation for the killings. But he refused to say what cash payments would be made to survivors and relatives "of this terrible deed."

The Japanese government, Fukunaga added, is not planning to ask Israel to extradite

airport arrived in an Air France flight from Paris and Rome, took submachine guns and grenades out of their luggage, and opened fire in the crowded customs hall. A Palestinian guerrilla organization in Lebanon claimed responsibility for the massacre, saying it demonstrated international solidarity among revolutionaries.

Monday, the day mentioned in the warning to Air France, is the fifth anniversary of the start of the six-day war between Israel and the Arabs.

What you should know about the proposed constitution

- Our present constitution provides revenue for building Montana's highways. These funds are designated for highway construction and come from gross vehicle fees, excise and license taxes on gasoline and other highways fuels. The proposed constitution will allow the legislature, by a three-fifths vote, to divert these highways funds for other purposes, such as welfare, public education or even to balance the state budget. This will endanger the state's highway program because it will eliminate matching funds by the federal government. (The federal government pays 75% of Montana highway construction costs.) (See Article 8)
- Our present constitution is a document of fundamental importance. It is more than just the 1889 wording. It is also the approximately 50 amendments made since then and many court decisions interpreting it. Its replacement should only be undertaken after serious deliberation and debate by the voters. Thirty days before an election is not enough time for Montanans to review or debate a proposed constitution.
- Our present constitution allows the state to levy two mills property tax for emergency purposes and six mills for higher education after the people have approved the levy at the polls. In the proposed constitution, the two mill levy on property tax is eliminated and the limit on local government debt is removed. This allows the legislature by 3/5 vote to tax property for any amount, without restrictions or approval by the people. (See Article 8)
- The proposed constitution allows for "third party suits." This allows an injured workman to first collect under his Workman's Compensation coverage, and then sue; or bring action against the party who has hired his employer in some cases. Montana's Supreme Court has twice ruled that such third party suits could not be instituted because it defeats the basic principal of Workman's Compensation. The wording contained in the proposed constitution is an obvious attempt to negate these Supreme Court decisions. (See Article II, Section 16).
